After completing our wonderful convention in sunny San Diego, we now turn our focus to the year ahead as we continue to attempt to deliver to the very specific needs of our members. This has been an unusual year for the DNA leadership as we have struggled with some new considerations on organizational structure and recruitment.

What an exciting time to be in dermatology, though! As our keynote speaker, Dr. Robert Kalb, noted, a cascade of new treatments has been approved in the last two years and more are on the horizon. Among the array of cutting edge treatments to offer our patients are: JAK-1 oral agents available for alopecia areata and others developed for teens with atopic dermatitis, expansion of adalimumab biosimilars, steroid free topicals for seborrheic dermatitis, new multifaceted topicals for acne, an innovative topical for dystrophic epidermolysis bullosa as well as the arrival of a treatment for molluscum contagiosum, the ongoing success of oral TYK2 inhibitor and a new injectable inhibitor of IL-17A and IL-17F both assisting our patients with psoriasis with different mechanisms of action. We are fortunate to be able to tailor our treatment strategies to the needs of our patients with so much research and innovation.



The DNA is committed to the continuing education of all NP's, nurses, and team members not only to inform our nursing practice but to foster shared decision making with our patients. We too at the DNA are on the cusp of innovation. It is with great pride that our editors of the JDNA, our flagship research-based nursing journal, announced that they had achieved an "IMPACT FACTOR". Impact factors are critical to the success of an academic journal as they reflect how often the articles are cited by others. In turn, this correlates with the quality of the publication. It usually takes a long time for a journal to become established and then even longer for an audience to discover its quality. Kudos to Angela Borger and Kyleen Davis for this remarkable achievement. Another new development this past year was the online availability of the DNA Joan Shelk Fundamentals of Phototherapy Workshop giving access to a whole new generation of nurses regarding this important treatment modality. Although phototherapy is not as widely used as in decades past, it still has its place among our armamentarium of treatments either as an adjunct therapy or as a primary therapy for those who are not candidates, or decline, other systemic measures.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Trudy Adamson and the members of our EAC for their continuous efforts in developing our educational content and access. The DNA will start its 43rd year in 2024 with a continued emphasis on offering state of the art education but also stressing the importance of connection and belonging. We intend to make changes to increase participation and opportunities for volunteerism throughout the organization and within the board. We hope you will consider becoming more involved with your DNA family and we welcome your suggestions, ideas, talents, and ingenuity as we strive to promote nursing excellence.

On the Job

Describe your experience with DNA.


On the Side

Dermatology Nurses' Association Awards/Scholarships Program


RUTH FANFAN, BSN, RN, DNP CANDIDATE


How has volunteering with DNA enriched you as a person?

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NP SPOTLIGHT INTERVIEW

MELISSA ADAIR, DNP, FNP-BC, DCNP

What is your name?

Melissa Adair

What setting do you work in?

I practice Medical Dermatology at Oregon Health & Sciences University in Portland, Oregon.

How long have you been a nurse practitioner?

I graduated from the University of Washington DNP program in 2018.

How long have you worked as an NP in dermatology or a dermatology-related discipline? Since 2018.

Can you describe your role as an NP in your practice and the healthcare team?

I practice medical dermatology in an academic setting. Much of my clinical day focuses on performing full body skin exams, with an emphasis on early skin cancer detection and high-risk skin cancer surveillance. I also get to treat a wide variety of inflammatory skin conditions ranging from atopic dermatitis and psoriasis to cutaneous T cell lymphoma and calciphylaxis. I also have a special interest in nail and hair conditions, and I currently assist in running our institution's hair clinic with my physician colleague. Additionally, I am an instructor of dermatology who loves teaching, and I get to teach nurse practitioner students, physician assistant students, and medical students during clinic. I also get to teach skills sessions several times per year for the OHSU nurse practitioner program.

What kind of procedures do you do daily?

Skin biopsies by punch and shave technique, electrodessication & curettage, cryotherapy, sharp wound debridement, Grenz ray therapy, Kenalog injections for inflammatory alopecias/keloids/inflammatory skin disorders, and candida injections and cantharidin for verrucae.

What is your favorite part of your job as a dermatology NP?

I have several favorite aspects of working in dermatology. Foremost, I love working with my team. I feel very honored to have the opportunity to work with such astute and enthusiastic colleagues who energize me and continually help me understand dermatology differently. I also enjoy the mental challenge of dermatology, in which I get to use pattern recognition and investigative skills to figure out complex rashes. Additionally, I love partnering with my patients to help them achieve control of their skin, hair, and nail conditions.

What advice would you give to aspiring dermatology nurse practitioners?

Find a mentor early on. I was very fortunate to have attended the University of Washington, where my program director was a dermatology nurse practitioner. I knew that I wanted a career in dermatology and voiced my interest to my director, who helped me get an extended clinical rotation with a dermatologist during my last year of NP school. During my NP program, I attended multiple dermatology conferences across the country (many dermatology conferences are free or discounted for students!), and I met people who helped me better understand what it really means to be a nurse practitioner in dermatology. I highly recommend attending any conferences you can and trying to attend conferences in different geographic regions to be exposed to different people and different ways of doing things. I also recommend applying for a fellowship, residency, or formal training position in dermatology. I had the opportunity to complete a dermatology fellowship, which really helped me gain the foundational knowledge I needed to launch my career as a dermatology nurse practitioner. In addition, I engaged in other programs offering mentorship and support, such as attending the one-year Florida Atlantic University Post Grad Nurse Practitioner Certificate Program and the one-year Diversity in Dermatology Achieve program. I highly recommend programs, such as these, that focus on fundamental dermatology curriculum, combined with mentor support.

NURSE PRACTITIONER IN DERMATOLOGY

A nurse practitioner in dermatology is a clinician who offers holistic, high-quality care for their patients. They have advanced clinical training beyond their initial professional registered nurse preparation with a master's or doctoral degree and advanced education and training in the specialty. Many nurse practitioners also achieve dermatology nurse practitioner certification demonstrating a higher degree of professional competence. Nurse practitioners are highly-trained dedicated professionals who are trusted by both patients and other healthcare providers.

Expertise in dermatology is accomplished through specialty training or completion of a post-graduate internship program. In addition, the dermatology nurse practitioner participates in independent continuing education activities such as those offered by professional organizations such as Dermatology Nurses' Association (DNA).

Increasing health care needs are driving the growth of the profession. Nurse practitioners in dermatology provide high-quality comprehensive care for diverse patient populations, increase patient access to healthcare services and decrease wait times to care.


Nurse practitioners in dermatology emphasize the patient-centered holistic approach to dermatology through expert care, comprehensive examination, clear communication and continuity of care.


