Pending action items were reviewed. M. Dunn and A. Chrupcala, invited guests from Withum, Smith, & Brown, PC, DNA's auditors, who joined the meeting to discuss their company, their role within our organization, and delineate between a full audit versus a review. It was noted that for the last few years, a review (that reviews inquiries) was performed instead of a more intensive and costly audit (which reviews year end issues and testing transactions). The BOD treasurer and the financial oversight committee also reviews this information, and the board is privy to all financial discussions. Notably, there are no State or Federal Audit requirements. The auditors agreed that internal controls currently in place were satisfactory to the organization. Following this discussion, the board completed BOD orientation reviewing board liaison and board member assignments and responsibilities.

There was a Fisher Investments presentation by T.J. Beuhler that reviewed a DNA mandate for this reserve fund for Fisher investments to manage, comprised of 70% equity and 30% fixed income. Fisher investments assesses portfolios such as this against benchmarks: The equity (stocks) benchmark and the fixed income (bonds) benchmark. The benchmarks measure return as well as risk components. Since inception on 12/5/2008, the performance summary of DNA's portfolio is up by 246% in reserve funds. DNA staff also presented information about EBG-Member Deals, and the DNA motioned to extend these benefits to members at no cost to the DNA. The board reviewed the EAC needs assessment recommendations in preparation to share these with the 2025 program planning committee for conference.

Welcome to the Dermatology Certified RN (DNC) Online Review Course. This course was designed to provide the RN with a concise study guide to help prepare for the certification examination. It represents the countless volunteer hours of authors, vetters, and pilot testers. The course consists of 6 modules. The subject matter for each module was derived from content mapping of the DNC examination. Each module has accompanying review questions. Continuing education credit is obtained by successfully completing the review questions and attaining a score of at least 70%. Completion of the evaluation for each course is required to attain the continuing education certificate. Eligible for up to 11.5 Nursing Continuing Professional **Development/Continuing Education (NCPD/CE)** credits, which includes 1.00 ANCC Pharmacotherapeutic Contact Hour Credit.

Election Year and In-Person Meetings

As we approach another critical election year, it's more important than ever to engage with our elected representatives, especially when they are home from session. These moments provide a unique opportunity to discuss issues that matter most to our profession and the patients we serve. Whether it's advocating for better access to dermatological care, discussing the need for more funding in skin cancer research, or addressing workplace safety, meeting with our representatives while they are in their home districts allows us to personalize our concerns and share real stories from the field. Often, there are pre-determined open meetings or town halls you can find to get a feel for the current landscape. For individual relationship building and patient advocacy topics, it is best to meet individually.

Meeting in person with a local representative involves several key steps. First, you'll need to identify who your local representative is, which can be done by using online tools provided by government websites. Once you have this information, the next step is to contact their office to request a meeting. It's best to reach out well in advance, as representatives often have busy schedules, especially during election years. When you contact their office, be clear about the issues you want to discuss and why they matter to you and your community. Be prepared to provide flexible dates and times for the meeting, as this increases the likelihood of securing an appointment.

Once the meeting is scheduled, it's important to prepare thoroughly. Research the representative's stance on the issues you want to discuss and gather any relevant data, personal stories, or professional experiences that can help illustrate your points. On the day of the meeting, arrive early and dress professionally. During the meeting, stay focused on your key messages, be respectful, and ensure you express gratitude for their time. After the meeting, it's a good idea to follow up with a thank-you note, reiterating the points discussed and offering to provide any additional information or assistance in the future. This process not only helps establish a relationship with your representative but also ensures your voice is heard on important matters affecting your field and community.

With the heightened attention on constituent voices during election periods, your engagement can have a significant impact. I encourage you to take advantage of the time when your representative is home to schedule a meeting or attend a town hall. This is a chance to ensure that our perspectives as dermatology professionals are heard and considered in policy decisions. Let's make our voices count where it matters most—right in our own communities.

A nurse practitioner in dermatology is a clinician who offers holistic, high-quality care for their patients. They have advanced clinical training beyond their initial professional registered nurse preparation with a master's or doctoral degree and advanced education and training in the specialty. Many nurse practitioners also achieve dermatology nurse practitioner certification demonstrating a higher degree of professional competence. Nurse practitioners are highly-trained dedicated professionals who are trusted by both patients and other healthcare providers.

Expertise in dermatology is accomplished through specialty training or completion of a post-graduate internship program. In addition, the dermatology nurse practitioner participates in independent continuing education activities such as those offered by professional organizations such as Dermatology Nurses' Association (DNA).

Increasing health care needs are driving the growth of the profession. Nurse practitioners in dermatology provide high-quality comprehensive care for diverse patient populations, increase patient access to healthcare services and decrease wait times to care.


Nurse practitioners in dermatology emphasize the patient-centered holistic approach to dermatology through expert care, comprehensive examination, clear communication and continuity of care.

- Works with other health care professionals to provide comprehensive care




